SSP announces transformative gift

# MIT's Security Studies Program has received a \$45 million gift from The Stanton

Foundation to expand its leading work on the vital issue of global nuclear security. The support will allow the program to create the Center for Nuclear Security Policy, while extending and enhancing research, teaching, and policy outreach in an area where the Institute is a longstanding leader with wide-ranging faculty expertise. Vipin Narang, the Frank Stanton Professor of Nuclear Security and Political Science at MIT, will serve as the center's first director. Read the full MIT News story






The participants were split into two teams playing the same game with minor variations. This methodological approach

created an experimental design, allowing SSP to glean more generalizable research findings from the game's proceedings. The Wargaming Lab also hosted its first Summer Wargaming Institute in July/August 2024, providing training on wargame design to two dozen attendees from academia and government. The Institute featured five days of interactive seminars coupled with handson, practical demonstrations of wargames for research, teaching, and policy analysis.










